UNVEILED

Hip-hop legend Rico Wade was honored with a permanent monument on May 9 at Headland and Delowe drives. East Point Mayor Deana Holiday Ingraham led the ceremony, joined by hip-hop icons including Ray Murray, Patrick 'Sleepy' Brown, Big Boi, and members of Goodie Mob. In attendance were Councilwoman Sharon Shropshire, Chantal Francois from the East Point CVB, and Fulton County Commissioner Marvin Arrington, Jr. Wade's sons unveiled the tribute as crowds chanted "Reek!" for the producer who helped launch OutKast and shaped Atlanta's music legacy.

EAST POINT STATE OF THE CITY

Mayor Deana HolidayIngraham, the 34thMayor of East Point, continues her people-focused leadership as she serves her secondterm throughDecember 2025. Under her stewardship, East Point has emerged as a model for inclusive municipal governance, earning recognition as both a "City of Civility" by the Georgia Municipal Association and a "Welcoming City" through the AARP Network of Age-Friendly States and Communities.

MAYOR DEANA HOLIDAY INGRAHAM CHARTS COURSE FOR CONTINUED GROWTH AND COMMUNITY INVESTMENT

Mayor Ingraham has prioritized environmental justice by implementing new zoning codes requiring industrial buildings be at least one mile from residential areas, addressing over a century of environmental inequity.

The city is part of a coalition that received a \$50 million federal grant for a 31.5-mile multi-use trail to reconnect communities previously divided by transportation infrastructure. Additionally, through Atlanta's Station Soccer initiative, the city is developing mini soccer fields near MARTA stations to provide youth with safe recreational spaces.





JANICE DRIVE INTERSECTION PROJECT BEGINS

Construction through December 2026

The City of East Point will realign Janice Drive to improve safety at the Washington Road intersection. Work starts May 27, 2025, and finishes December 21, 2026.

The project will:

- · Realign Janice Drive to connect with Candlewood Drive SW
- Install a new traffic signal
- Add sidewalks for pedestrian safety
- Reconstruct driveways and resurface roads

Areas Affected

Washington Road: St. Mark Lutheran Church to 300 feet north of Janice Drive Janice Drive: Pelot Drive to Washington Road.

Traffic Impact

Expect road and lane closures throughout construction. Add 5-10 minutes to travel times. Two weeks' advance notice will be provided for major closures.

EAST POINT WATER TESTS 100% CLEAN FOR PFAS

City exceeds EPA requirements two years ahead of schedule

Our 2024 water testing detected zero measurable PFAS levels in the city's drinking water supply.

What This Means: PFAS (per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances) are chemicals that have raised health concerns nationwide. While the EPA doesn't require PFAS testing until 2027 and solutions until 2029, East Point set an ambitious goal to meet these standards by 2025 – and we've exceeded expectations.
